From the Fathers (and others):

St. John Climacus:

Humility is constant forgetfulness of one's achievements.

The slave of the belly ponders the menu with which to celebrate the feast. The servant of God, however, thinks of the graces that may enrich him.

As with the appearance of light, darkness retreats; so, at the fragrance of humility, all anger and bitterness vanishes.

When you are depressed, bear in mind the Lord's command to Peter to forgive a sinner seventy times seven (cf. Mt. 18:22). And you may be sure that He Who gave this command to another will Himself do very much more.

Repentance is the renewal of baptism. Repentance is a contract with God for a second life.

When a ray of sunlight enters the house through a crack, it lights up everything inside, and even the finest dust in its beam. So it is with the fear of the Lord, it reveals all the fallibility still lurking there.

The lover of silence draws close to God. He talks to Him in secret, and God enlightens him. Jesus, by silences, shamed Pilate; and a man, by his silence, conquers vainglory.

It is detestable and dangerous for a wrestler to be slack at the start of a contest, thereby giving proof of his impending defeat to everyone. Let us have a firm beginning to our religious life, for this will help us if a certain slackness comes later. A bold and eager soul will be spurred on by the memory of its first zeal and new wings can then be obtained.

Ascend, brothers, ascend eagerly, and be resolved in your hearts to ascend and hear Him who says: Come and let us go up to the mountain of the Lord, and to the house of our God, who makes our feet like hind's feet, and sets us upon high places, that we might be victors with His song!

In the hearts of the meek the Lord finds rest, but a turbulent soul is a seat for the devil.

Those who enter into the good fight know that it is hard and narrow, and must leap into the fire if they desire the celestial fire to dwell within them.

While it is our deepest hope that Christendom will one day fulfill Christ's desire for true unity among all those who claim His name (John 17:21), the unfortunate reality of our day is that the various segments of Christendom are not unified with the historic Orthodox faith. Since participation in the Eucharist expresses a unity with all the dogma and practice of the Orthodox Church, non-Orthodox guests do not receive Holy Communion. The Holy Eucharist is reserved for those members of the Orthodox Church who have prepared themselves by prayer, fasting, and recent confession. All visitors and unprepared Orthodox are invited to partake of the blessed bread as they come forward to venerate the cross at the end of the Liturgy. Thank you for your understanding.

LIBRARY LINES

Today is John Climacus Sunday, but his feast day was March 30. Does St. John Climacus and the *Ladder of Divine Ascent* have anything to do with Jacob's Ladder? Read comparisons of these and commentary on them by Sts. Theophan the Recluse in *The Path to Salvation* (PAT THE), p. 319 ff., Isaac the Syrian in *Ascetic Discourses* (PAT ISA) (see index), and in *Sacred Symbols That Speak*, V. 1 by Anthony Coniaris. John Climacus Sunday is a moveable feast, as are the other Sundays of Lent. The days on which we celebrate them are determined by the date of Pascha. Sts. John Climacus, Gregory Palamas and Mary of Egypt have their own feast days as well. Typically, a saint is commemorated on the day of his death.

Often we hear references of The Seventy. We know about Sts. Timothy, Stephen, Titus, Cleopas, Luke, and Mark; however, many of them are not familiar to us. St. Aristarchus (4/15) is mentioned several times in the Book of Acts and the Epistles of St. Paul. He traveled with St. Paul and was a bishop in Syria. All of them are commemorated on January 4 on the Synaxis of the Seventy.

Saturday we commemorate one who helped us begin our Lenten journey, St. Zacchaeus (4/20). He is an icon to us of putting his repentance into action by climbing a tree to see Christ and giving three-fold restitution to those he had cheated. Tradition tells us that St. Peter ordained him as a bishop and that he died a peaceful death.

Child Martyr Gabriel of Bialystok (4/20) was killed in Poland in 1690 when he was only six years old. One day when his parents were not home, he was lured out of his house by a man named Schutko, and then killed. After thirty years, the martyred child's body was found to be incorrupt. Read more about him in Let the Little Children Come To Me (HAG- - -SAI).
