The Church is the entrance into the risen life of Christ; it is communion in life eternal, "joy and peace in the Holy Spirit." And it is the expectation of the "day without evening" of the Kingdom; not of any "other world," but of the fulfillment of all things and all life in Christ. In Him death itself has become an act of life, for He has filled it with Himself, with His love and light. In Him "all things are yours; whether the world, or life, or death, or things present, or things to come; all are yours; and ye are Christ's; and Christ is God's (1 Cor 3:21-23). And if I make this new life mine, mine this hunger and thirst for the Kingdom, mine this expectation of Christ, mine the certitude that Christ is Life, then my very death will be an act of communion with Life. For neither life nor death can separate us from the love of Christ.

Welcome to all those visiting St. John Orthodox Church. We are honored by your presence. It is our sincere desire that your participation today in the Divine Liturgy will draw you closer to Christ and His Church.

If you are from a non-Orthodox background, you may see new things such as icons, incense, the sign of the cross, the veneration of saints, and a great deal of standing. These can be perplexing to the uninitiated eye. Rest assured that everything we do has a solid biblical foundation and a long history among Christian people. Please feel free to participate where you feel comfortable and feel equally as free only to observe when you prefer.

The Orthodox Church understands the Eucharist, or Lord's Supper, to be – among other things – the paramount expression of Christian unity. While it is our deepest hope that Christendom will one day fulfill Christ's desire for true unity among all those who claim His name (John 17:21), the unfortunate reality of our day is that the various segments of Christendom are not unified with the historic Orthodox faith. *Since participation in the Eucharist expresses a unity with all the dogma and practice of the Orthodox Church, non-Orthodox guests do not receive Holy Communion.* The Holy Eucharist is reserved for those members of the Orthodox Church who have prepared themselves by prayer, fasting, and recent confession. All visitors and unprepared Orthodox are invited to partake of the blessed bread as they come forward to venerate the cross at the end of the Liturgy. Thank you for your understanding.



#### LIBRARY LINES

Can you name all of the Myrrh-bearers? Do you know that Sts. Joseph of Arimathea (7/31) and Nicodemas (8/2) are also numbered with the holy women? Do you know each of their connections to Christ? Read their stories in *The Life of the Virgin Mary: The Theotokos* and in *Married Saints of the Church*. Also, look for Alexander Schmemann's chapter on the Sunday of the Myrrh-bearing Women in his *Celebration of Faith* series, *The Church Year*.

Monday, we commemorate the Prophet Isaiah (5/9). On Holy Friday and Pascha, we sang, "Isaiah saw the never-setting light of the compassionate manifestation to us as God, O Christ. Rising early from the night he cried out, 'The dead shall arise.' Those in the tombs shall awake. All those on earth shall greatly rejoice." His prophesies about the virgin birth and the sufferings of Christ were also gloriously put to music by George Handel in *The Messiah*. Isaiah died a martyr's death, and his relics are on Mt. Athos.

This week we commemorate two of the Apostles, our own St. John the Evangelist (5/8) and St. Simon the Zealot (5/10). According to the OCA website, Tradition tells us that St. Simon was the bridegroom at the wedding of Cana. From then on, he became a zealous believer in Christ. After Pentecost, he travelled and evangelized extensively from the Black Sea to Britain. He was crucified and is also commemorated on June 30 with the other Apostles. Read more about them in *Disciples of Christ* (KID STS SPR) and *Notes of the Holy Apostles* (REF HAG - - - MAS).

Sts. Cyril and Methodius (5/11) are known as equal to the apostles and enlighteners of the Slavs. Equal-to-the-Apostles is a special title given to some saints in recognition of their outstanding service for spreading the Gospel, which is comparable to that of the original Apostles. (Among others who have been given this distinction are Sts. Mary Magdalene, Nina, Thekla, Helen and Constantine, Nicholas of Japan and Great Prince Vladimir.) Sts. Cyril and Methodius devised a Slavonic alphabet and translated books used in celebrating the divine services and almost the entire Old Testament. Investigate more about them in *Byzantium and the Slavs* (HIS OBO), *Orthodox Alaska* (HIS OLE), and *A Gift for Ianko* (KID STS CYR).

Saturday, we honor the Venerable Isidore, the Fool-For-Christ (5/14). He lived a privileged childhood in Germany, but left home to find the Kingdom of God. He converted to Orthodoxy from Catholicism and wandered to Russia. He made his home in a wooden shack in Rostov. During the day he acted like a crazy man yet he was compassionate and worked miracles. By night, he slept little, praising God in all night vigils. In 1474 the townsmen discovered his body when they passed by his hut and smelled a sweet fragrance. The OCA website says that according to S.A. Bulgakov's *Handbook for Clergy*, he was called Isidore Tvgerdislov, meaning "constant of word," because he talked constantly. Read more about fools-for-Christ in *The Freedom of Morality*, (CAT SPEC YAN), *The Inner Kingdom* (CAT SAC WAR) *Seraphim's Seraphim* (HAG SER HTM), and "Pillars to Heaven: Stylite Sites of the Levant" in *Road to Emmaus*, #22, summer 2005. Read about a modern-day fool-for-Christ in *Crazy John* (BIO JOH MAK).
